#### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

It's interesting how an event can be interpreted by different people. God's revelation of himself in the birth of the child Jesus is clearly one such event. The Magi, Gentiles from the east, had heard of this "newborn king of the Jews" and undertook a long and arduous journey to see him and offer him homage. They were edified and eager in their search. Herod, himself a king - of the Jews - did not have the same reaction. The very thought of this "newborn king" threatened him and filled him with rage and suspicion. In this moment in human history, the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles (i.e., the Epiphany) unveils the truth of God's redemptive work for all of creation to be reconciled to himself. This truth has been accepted and rejected throughout time. and our celebration of this feast gives us an opportunity to give thanks in a focused and particular way for our acceptance of it - to give thanks for the gift of our faith. Perhaps it is even a moment for us to have our own, colloquial epiphany: an "aha moment," where we once again truly understand the depth of God's love for us.

#### GO EVANGELIZE

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

The Magi, the Gentiles from the east, were changed after their encounter with the Christ Child; they were warned not to return to Herod and they obeyed and took a different route home. In today's second reading, St. Paul says it has been revealed that Gentiles are "coheirs, members of the same body" - the body of Christ. Just as the magi were forever changed by their journey, so must we be. Their journey is a model for us, but we do not have to seek Christ in the world as they did; he is here with us, in Word and in the Eucharist. The Incarnation of Jesus is pure gift to our weary, troubled world. As we heard in Isaiah, "rise up! ... [our] light has come, the glory of the Lord shines upon [us]." As the Magi followed the light of the star, let us rise to the occasion and respond to God's light in our world by recognizing the good gifts God gives us each day. And then thank him for his enduring presence in our lives.

PRAY Lord God of heaven and earth, | you revealed your only-begotten Son to every nation by the guidance of a star ... | Fill us with the light of Christ, | that our concern for others may reflect your love. | We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.




#### What is Medical Assistance in Dying (MAiD)?

MAiD is the Canadian legislation that allows physicians, nurse practitioners, and pharmacists to carry out euthanasia and assisted suicide.

#### **Reasons for Choosing MAiD:**

\*According to the Third Annual Report on MAiD in Canada 2021



MAiD removes the ethical and moral responsibility society has to take care of the aging and vulnerable.

#### What is Assisted Suicide?

Assisted suicide is the provision or prescription of a drug that the eligible person takes themselves, in order to bring about their own death.

#### What is Euthanasia?

Euthanasia is the direct administration of a substance that causes death, such as an injection of a drug. This substance is administered by a physician or nurse practitioner.

In 2021, MAiD was the sixth leading cause of death in Canada with 10,064 Canadians choosing to die by euthanasia or assisted suicide.



#### MAiD in Canada Compared to California:


To put into perspective how unrestrained MAiD is in Canada, the state of California legalized MAiD in 2016, the same year as Canada. California and Canada have approximately the same population, 39



million and 38 million respectively. Yet in 2021, 486 Californians died by MAiD compared to 10,064 Canadians.

#### MAiD by the Numbers:

MAiD deaths are increasing steadily every year in Canada since Medical Assistance in Dying was legalized in 2016.



# "Aging is not a problem to be solved, but a meaning to be lived out."

End-of-life can be a difficult topic to discuss, but it's an important discussion to have. When you're healthy, it's natural not to think about what might happen if you experienced a serious illness or injury. But this is actually the best time to talk about it.

Begin by talking to your loved ones and your doctor about your care should disease or injury happen. By planning ahead, you'll have peace of mind that you'll receive the medical care you want and your family will be able to focus on making sure your wishes are respected.

#### Questions to discuss with your children or family members include:

What are my concerns and fears about dying?

What do I want to be able to do in the time I have left?

Who would I like to see again?

Are there people I need to reconcile with?

Will I want to pursue all possible treatments or are there some I would prefer to forego

because of the potential impact they could have on my quality of life?

Who would I like to make health decisions on my behalf if I can't?

#### Questions to discuss with your doctors should you fall ill:

What is my prognosis?

What is the likelihood that I could be cured?

What is your projection for how much longer I will live?

If I decide to undergo treatment, what effect may it have on prolonging my life and how will it impact my quality of life?

What types of risks and side effects does the treatment have and how severe are they?

If I decide not to undergo treatment, how much longer may I live?

Do I want to spend my remaining time in the hospital or do I want to be at home?

By thinking about your goals, priorities and the types of care and interventions you do and do not wish to undergo before you face a serious illness or injury, you and your loved ones will have a better experience at the end.

#### A message from Myron Rogal, diocesan Coordinator of Justice and Peace and Fr. Kevin McGee, Pastor at St. Mary Parish, Saskatoon

A night-time warm-up site at St. Mary Parish Hall in Saskatoon has now been in operation since Dec. 4" 2023. There has certainly been some learning and adapting in these early days, yet expectations have been exceeded, and overall, the site has been operating smoothly while serving its purpose: providing a safe and warm place for those without shelter on winter nights. Your prayers have certainly been a factor in this success, so thank you!

The early numbers and demographics have already presented some interesting realities. Firstly, the numbers are higher than predicted; this points to a lack of options and wider opportunities, with our neighbours facing immediate housing challenges. An analogy I've been using for this site is that of an ambulance in that the site serves as an emergency measure at the start of a wider continuum of care.

Another interesting piece is that a high number of women have been visiting the site as a refuge. This is significant as there is a feeling of safety and, at the same time, points to a vulnerable state that many women find themselves in. Communication has been another highlight from the staff and leadership of the Salvation Army, with regular reporting and sharing of concerns as well as successes. Support for maintaining the quality of the site and the experience of the guests has been another blessing from the leadership of the police service, the fire service, and respective city departments, as well as collaborating neighbourhood agencies. The desire of individuals, parishes and recently from another Christian denomination to support the initiative remains strong, and we are suggesting several ways to pour out that generosity.

#### Ways to help:

- 1. **Pray**. Be deliberate in taking a moment each day to pray for the guests of the site and everyone involved.
- 2. **Advocate**. St. Mary's is one small, albeit important piece in affirming the human dignity of the poor and vulnerable. As these are unprecedented times in the city, province and beyond, take time to meet, inform and work with elected officials as well as agencies and people of other faiths to take collective steps that will reduce poverty.

#### 3. Donate:

Option #1: monetary donations:

The Community of St. Mary Parish has partnered with the Salvation Army to provide the overnight warm-up location in its upper hall for the winter months.

As the needs of those who are the most vulnerable in our city will continue beyond this time frame, St. Mary Parish will be discerning how it can continue to provide outreach and support for those in our neighbourhood who, for a variety of reasons, live without access to many basic needs. The parish hopes to eventually have the financial resources to hire or contract someone to coordinate an outreach ministry that will work with other parishes and volunteers in the Roman Catholic Diocese of Saskatoon and partners like the Salvation Army. To this end, any financial support would be greatly appreciated. Donations to this project can be made in the following ways:

- a. Cheques can be made out to St. Mary's Parish, with "Warm up shelter" written in the memo line. Cheques can either be dropped off or mailed to St. Mary Parish, 211 Avenue O South, Saskatoon, SK S7M 2R6.

As this project is new, we are still discerning and discussing with those serving on the front lines where volunteers might be able to serve most effectively. We have not forgotten or lost track of you and will reach out when this opportunity becomes a reality.







# Do You See What I See?

Today's Gospel answers this question quite definitively: No! Not everyone saw the guiding star in the sky. Not even those who, presumably, knew the prophecy found in the reading from Isaiah. That ancient prophet announced to the people of Jerusalem: "Your light has come" (Isaiah 60:1). In fact, he promised them they would be so embraced by that light, they themselves would shine brightly with its radiance. But when the time came, not everyone saw it. Or, having seen it, they did not recognize it.

The people of Jesus' time were not ignorant of these prophecies. They

We know that not everyone in Israel rejected Jesus. Shepherds had already thrilled at this birth. Someone in Bethlehem had opened his stable to this Child and his parents. Now we add the stargazers from another country. It seems the invitation to come to him is extended to all: political and religious leaders, the unsophisticated and marginalized, the established homeowner, the foreigners in our midst. They are all asked: "Did you see what I saw? What do you think of him?" †



# Beneath the Whitewash

There is a story told in Holland about an old church. For many years, upon entering it, everyone would stop and bow in the direction of a whitewashed wall. Nobody knew exactly why anybody did that, but everyone had been doing it for such a long time that nobody questioned it. It was tradition. It felt right.

One day, the parish decided to renovate the church. They began to strip the paint and whitewash off the old walls. They discovered traces of a painting on the wall that everyone bowed to. They gently peeled off the whitewash so as not to damage what was beneath it. Slowly, a very beautiful, centuries-old painting of Christ emerged. Nobody alive was old enough to have actually seen it before. It had been hidden for at least a century. Yet everyone had been bowing to it, not knowing why, but sensing that there was a good reason for the reverence.



There is a Christmas lesson in that. Western culture still bows toward the crib of Bethlehem. Like the people in that church in Holland, many are unclear why we are doing what we are doing. There is not much conscious faith left in secular Christmas celebrations, just a habitual response to a tradition.

But—as the story of the recovered painting can teach us—that's not all bad. It's better than not bowing to the wall at all. At least we still have the sense that there is something special beneath the whitewash. If we are among the ones who know that there is a painting of Christ behind the whitewash, our response should not be one of cynicism. Our task is not to stop the bowing or the celebration. Our task is to help peel off the whitewash, to help restore the painting beneath it, and to tell the story of who did the painting and why.

The best way to help our culture to celebrate Christmas properly is not by criticizing how it celebrates, but by celebrating in a better way. Let our joy exceed that of the commercial world! Let our bow be deeper and more aware of the marvelous gift that's behind the whitewash: the gift of the Incarnation of our God! †

The **Preparation of the Gifts** allows time for the preparation of our hearts. Like the Magi bearing gifts and doing homage to Majesty, we bring our gifts and our praise to the Table. —Father Paul Boudreau

God has first blessed us with the gift of creation. Humans take those gifts given, wheat and grapes, and, using our creativity, make bread and wine. Then, we bring those gifts we have received and labored over to present them at the Altar/Table that they might be transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ. Finally, we receive them back in Communion. The procession of the **Gifts** says, in essence, "Behold the gifts God has given us!"

#### Is Epiphany about giving or getting gifts?

"We three kings of Orient are/ bearing gifts we traverse afar." Nowhere in the gospels does it claim there are three kings. They are magi, hereditary priests of the ancient Medes and Persians. At least the carol gets one thing right: this wise group does bear gifts. Gold symbolizes wealth and power. Frankincense, used in prayer, represents the divine Presence. Myrrh prepares bodies for burial. It's an ominous sign that would make a startling gift. . . . But they were appropriate honors for the King of the Universe, the Divine Son, and the crucified Lord.

We also bear Jesus gifts at every Eucharist: bread, wine, and our financial sacrifice. "Made by human hands," these gifts are transformed and returned to us as the Body and Blood of Christ, and then redistributed for those in need.

More gifts come to us by way of this shared Table. Grace pours out on the assembly. Grace forgives sin, and rescues us from every evil. This is one gift you don't want to put at the bottom of a closet.

Here we meet the last runner, outside of the executive director from the Catholic Foundation, on the TRC team. It's a pleasure to bring this story all together at Christmas, a time of giving and reflection. We have found forgiveness, hope, and now unity in this story, characteristics that are part of what reconciliation is about and what all of us may need to focus on as we reflect on our own journeys and how we can help others to ultimately help ourselves.



born Sakura, Chiba prefecture, Japan pop. 170,601, currently lives in Edmonton, Alberta. He emigrated to Canada after travelling and decided he wanted to stay upon visiting. He says he started running at a young age, around 6 years old, and that was part of his family. Even though he ran many marathons, he didn't start running ultras until he was 30. His first ultra marathon was 125km, 'so my thought was that I can do a marathon in 3 hours and that race is basically 3 marathons and so they give you 24 hours just to go slow'. 'But I was wrong', he says. The second ultra he attempted was the Blackfoot race of 100 km and finishing it but yet wanting to try the Death Race again. Prior to his second attempt more preparation was needed so he attended their training camp whereby you run/walk through the entire course which was extremely helpful, so much so that he finished the race at 22 hours. He has completed the Death Race 14 times, you read correctly, 14. Not without incredible amounts of training and preparation, disappointment and upset. He ran several without finishing, one with only a few minutes past the cut off. He ran legs 4 and 5 of this race, 53 kms, all through the night, and was awe inspiring as I saw him come in at about 1:30 in the morning for the final checkpoint. His partner Angie Zee was there with his supply kit, and he trots in like he went for a run in the park, 'everything is ok, legs good, feet good, I feel good, not too hungry, just some meatballs' he tells me. As I walked over to get the meatballs I thought to myself how easy and calm he made it look, but that's Hiro and that calmness was with him everywhere he went, and he gave that to everyone around him without

expectation. He did find this type of race to be the most difficult simply because he wasn't aware of how everyone would run, their total time before he could start, the team environment etc. But he was so thankful that they asked him, he wondered what they would think, and was so honoured and happy to be asked, that was the beauty of this, he was asked. A great underlying tone here is that he emigrated here by himself, without any family, none at all. Japan is 7830 km from Edmonton, anywhere from 18-30 hours by plane depending on the price so not an easy place to get to, especially for a family emergency. His mom is still alive and is 78, and even though he misses home at times has no regrets about moving and living in Canada, and found it very welcoming. That says a lot about our country, and often even though we have many policy issues that are painful to recall, including the WWII Japanese internment camps whereby Canada forcibly relocated and incarcerated over 22,000 Japanese Canadians that didn't deter him or his decision. These moments in history, although we don't think of them this way, are teaching moments. Oversimplified, possibly, most definitely painful and require a cautious and careful discernment regarding what happens next. If you choose to hang onto anger or transgressions and how people have wronged you, nothing good can come from that. Eventually an inner peace will be required to move forward, let go and let God as they say, and try to experience the newness, the rebirth of where you are headed. This is more prevalent than ever as we approach Christmas and being part of the birth of Jesus Christ, reconciliation and reflection unified as one.



A few things to ponder after meeting these runners, spending a weekend in a tent for the first time again, and being around so many spiritual people. How do I know they are spiritual? As you mill about in the arena during the introduction to the race, and the 'shocking' news about the trail, water hazards, poorly marked areas, excessive mud bogs, etc, etc. You realize that no one is shocked, leaving, throwing their arms up in disappointment or dismay, and or trying to accost race volunteers or staff about a refund because things might not go as planned and this race may not be finishable. There was a certain calmness and ease at which everyone filed out and knew the task at hand. I don't know if everyone was religious and or even had an opinion about religion, however they had to ask themselves deeply if this was possible, and who would they ask if they needed help. The team organizer Raissa Bugyi had to ask when she needed team members. If they failed and possibly didn't finish, could they forgive themselves? Was there hope at times when all there was was despair? Would they find unity in a team that was unbeknownst to each other and from such different backgrounds? We can decide for

As we find ourselves in situations where we wonder how we got through that? Was it supposed to be part of my life journey, faith journey, healing journey? What does it mean to live a life that has purpose, how do we define that? I believe we don't get the answer until we are through. Maybe we have a few bucks in our pocket and think as we walk by the homeless person that they have made their choices so it's not my responsibility and that so and so is only going to waste it. So then don't give at all? Only focus on ourselves?

ourselves, and we have to daily.

When we are reading the current 'self help' bestseller, subscribing to social media for answers, fad diets, personality trait directives and character defect solutions we often miss what we were able to achieve simply by surrounding ourselves with the right people and having faith. As the readers reflect on this they may want to give themselves some credit for the things they have achieved, albeit small, even when they had little to no faith. Someone else did, Someone you can look up to.
