GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"The floor is lava!" We used to play this game as children, and it still seems popular today: you arrange furniture and other objects in such a way as to make it from point to point, and even room to room, without touching the floor. There may be more than one way to go, but the crux of the matter is that you have to use these waypoints to stay alive in the game. Following Jesus is somewhat similar, although obviously infinitely more serious and important! He himself, through his sacrifice on the cross, opened the doors of salvation to us – he has provided the ways and means to live free from death. His sacrifice is the only thing that makes it possible for us to enter heaven. In other words, he has arranged the spiritual furniture, made clear those waypoints, and, differing from children who play the lava game, is ready and willing to help us at any time to move safely and confidently along the journey. St Paul writes, "we are his handiwork, created in Christ Jesus for the good works that God has prepared in advance, that we should live in them."

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

St. Paul also writes, "by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not from you; it is the gift of God." And in today's Gospel, St. John writes these words we know so well. "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life." Both testaments include words of comfort, but John here also includes a call to action. Notice the word "might." Like "may," which is found in other translations, it indicates possibility, probability, and contingency. In other words, it is offered – freely given! – but we must accept. And acceptance means, just as the prophets shared with the Israelites, we need to follow God's commands. It means that in our words and deeds we act from and in love of God and love of one another. For "whoever lives the truth comes to the light, so that his works may be clearly seen as done in God."

ENGAGE Today we are about halfway through Lent. If you haven't yet taken advantage of the rich opportunity to pray the Stations of the Cross with your family, do so this week. Most parishes pray the stations on Fridays during Lent, and perhaps other days as well. This ancient tradition of our Church is a beautiful and meaningful way to walk the Way of the Cross with our Lord.

We adore you, O Christ, and bless you. Because by your holy cross you have redeemed the whole world.





SOLIDARITY SNAKES & LADDERS

HOW TO PLAY //

You will need:

- A die
- A coin, button or distinct object for each player

Take turns rolling the die and moving along the game board. If you land on the bottom of a ladder, follow the instructions for LADDERS below. If you land on the tail of a snake, follow the instructions for SNAKES below.

LADDERS

After Typhoon Haiyan (2013), Development and Peace – Caritas Canada cofounded a civil society coalition that helped 600+ Philippine families plan, design, build and manage the Pope Francis Village. Climb the ladder to celebrate Subsidiarity, whereby grassroots organizations conceive and pursue their own development.

A Montreal youth group's cheese sale raised \$11,000 to support Development and Peace – Caritas Canada's pursuit of the Preferential option for the poor. Climb the ladder to affirm this principle of reaching, accompanying and empowering the most vulnerable communities in the Global South.

Houses built in 2015 by one Haitian community recovering from a hurricane with the help of Development and Peace – Caritas Canada's partner ITECA withstood even an earthquake in 2021! Climb the ladder for the solidity of their Participation.

Hundreds of students across Ontario held a "<u>Dress Down, Speak Up</u>" day, raising awareness about the impacts of sweatshops and fast fashion. Climb the ladder to encourage the raising of voices for **Economic justice**.

Hundreds of Canadians have pledged to make their home, school or workplace a bottled-water-free zone, because water is a human right, not a commodity! Climb the ladder in affirmation of the Common good.

On October 15, 2021, Honduran land defender Víctor Vásquez was released from prison after a long campaign by our partner CEHPRODEC that Development and Peace – Caritas Canada supported! Climb the ladder to hail those who fulfill the Ecological responsibility of caring for the Earth, our common home.

Students at Notre Dame College School (Welland, Ont.) raised over \$20,000 during their annual Pilgrimage Walk to support Development and Peace – Caritas Canada partners. Climb the ladder for this act of Solidarity and think about organizing a walk!

In 2022-2023, 314 new <u>Share Year-Round</u> donors signed up! They give monthly because they believe in our mission to uphold the **Dignity of the human person**. Climb the ladder to celebrate their steadfast support.

In June 2023, a Development and Peace – Caritas Canada partner won the Environmental Peacebuilding Association Award for reporting on the environmental impact of armed conflict in the Middle East. Climb the ladder to celebrate their work for Peace.

Development and Peace – Caritas Canada's Colombian partner the Asociación Campesina de Antioquia (ACA, Peasant Association of Antioquia) helps peasant communities affected by armed conflict to defend their lives and territories and to build a culture of peace through filmmaking and art. Climb the ladder to celebrate this exercise of Rights and responsibilities.

SNAKES

- Around the world, human rights and environmental activists face great risks. In 2022, a record 401 human rights defenders were murdered. Nearly half of them had been working for land, environmental and Indigenous peoples' rights. Go down the snake and watch our video about the Guapinol defenders.
- In 2022, armed conflict claimed 238,000 lives (a 96% annual increase) and cost the global economy \$17.5 trillion. Go down the snake to mourn this destruction; watch our video on forced migration; and say a prayer for the victims of conflict around the world.
- In 2018, pollution from an open pit iron ore mine made the waters of the Guapinol river in Honduras unfit for household or agricultural use. Share the grief of communities fighting to protect their land, water and resources from unscrupulous mining and agri-business companies by going down the snake.
- The collapse of the Rana Plaza sweatshop complex killed 1,100+ garment industry workers in Bangladesh in 2013. Go down the snake to acknowledge our role in labour exploitation in the Global South. Do a little research to discover the supply chain (human chain) behind your clothes.
- Over 110 million people worldwide—the most ever—have been forced to flee their homes because of war, persecution, climate change, poverty, natural disasters or ill-conceived "development" projects. Go down the snake to decry this forced displacement. Revisit our <u>Share the Journey</u> campaign to learn more about this issue.
- Pakistan contributes less than 1% to global greenhouse gas emissions but suffers terrible effects of climate change. In 2022, unprecedented rains <u>flooded a third of the country</u>, killing 1,700 and leaving over 2 million people homeless. Go down the snake to contemplate the unfairness of the most impoverished peoples bearing the worst impacts of climate change.
- In 2013, Typhoon Haiyan killed more than 6,000 people and left some 4 million homeless in the Philippines. Go down the snake for all the communities having to face the effects of climate change, including more extreme, frequent and unpredictable hurricanes, droughts and floods.
- The world has lost almost 75% of its crop varieties. Crop genetic diversity is vanishing at a rate of about 2% per year. In North America alone, we've lost 90% of our fruit and vegetable varieties over the past century! Go down the snake to lament the loss of biodiversity around the world.
- Climate change-linked heat waves, droughts and water resource losses have caused great difficulty for peasant farming communities in the <u>Tigray region of Ethiopia</u>. Go down the snake for farmers who are losing their crops to adverse weather patterns.
- By 2023, up to 783 million people were facing hunger. That's a tenth of the human family! Go down the snake in sorrow for the unjust distribution of the Earth's bounty and resolve to support the small family farmers who produce 70% of the world's food supply.

e normally take great pride in making our own decisions. When we did this as children, it was a sign we were growing up; as adolescents, it was a proclamation of independence. Now as adults, when making decisions, we demonstrate we are self-directed. The problem doesn't seem to lie in decision-making itself, but in the options given to us. And there is the rub. Often these options are not of our choosing. This can cause decision-making to be very difficult.



hen I was a young child, my grandfather used to play a game with me as old as the dawn of time. He would take a cookie in his hand and show it to me. He proceeded to put both hands behind his back and then bring them to the front. Both hands were closed into fists.

"If you can guess what hand the cookie is in, you can have it," he would say. I would walk around his hands trying to catch a glimpse of the cookie. But his hands were large, and the cookie was well-tucked inside. Finally, I would venture a guess and tap a hand. Both hands would open and turn over, flat as plates.



On each hand was half a cookie. The scoundrel had broken the cookie in half behind his back.

I would say, "Pop, you cheated!" But by that time he had eaten one of the halves. With his mouth full, he would say to me, "You had better hurry."

I think we break both bread and life like that, half for us and half for others. Jesus ate the bread he broke and fed himself on his own life. Sacrificers are fed by their own sacrifice. This is a secret we seldom acknowledge. There is more love when we give it away rather than keep it, more love for those who give it and more love for those who receive it. In the world of Spirit, what is shared does not divide. It becomes more abundant. †

QUESTION OF THE WEEK

Will my faith make me happy?

The biblical idea of happiness is linked to *beatitude* (Latin for "bliss"). Jesus offers beatitudes in his Sermon on the Mount in Matthew's gospel. Often the primary word of each beatitude is translated as *blessed*. A more literal rendering might be the cry, "Happy you!" who are just, pure of heart, merciful, a peacemaker, and so on. God is the source of happiness, therefore doing as God does brings bliss.

So, the short answer to the question is, yes, living according to God's will makes you happy. It's the only thing, in fact, that does; or as Saint Thomas Aquinas declared, "God alone satisfies." Saint Paul lists **joy** as one of nine fruits of the Holy Spirit. Saint Francis de Sales went so far as to warn against giving in to excessive sadness as it's a counter-witness to the **joy** that comes in the life of faith.

Rejoice and be glad
