Studying Scripture is not a side dish on the plate of practicing the faith. It is an essential component of the virtuous life, and without it, our faith will surely falter. In his second letter to Timothy, Saint Paul reminds us that the Scriptures are the inspired Word of God and they train us in righteous living and equip us for every good work. There will undoubtedly be times when we feel ill-equipped – when we are fatigued, frustrated, or concerned. It is precisely in these moments that we're invited to go quickly to the holy Word of God! Read it, pray with it, and invite the Spirit to speak to you through it. There

you will find the wisdom needed to face every circumstance.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Our faith journey was never meant to be a solitary endeavor! We see this in today's first reading when Aaron and Hur stand beside Moses, holding his weary arms in the air as the battle rages on against the Amalekites. This image of the three men on the mountain - Moses with his arms raised high, Aaron and Hur on either side supporting them - is a powerful image of companionship in the Christian life. When you feel too weary to pray, look around - the Lord has likely given you companions who can support you precisely in the ways you need at this time. Pay attention, too, to who God might be inviting you to support in prayer. Our Gospel tells us that God always hears our prayer and calls us to be persistent in prayer. Certainly, God will "secure the rights of his chosen ones who call out to him day and night." God calls us to persist in prayer because it reveals our faith and trust in him that we constantly bring our needs before him.

REFLECT

Our readings offer helpful tools to turn to when discouragement or isolation may cloud our spiritual vision. Take some time this week to listen to the Lord's voice in Scripture. Or, if you're feeling weary, ask a few friends to pray with and for you. Remember that although God may seem distant, he always hears us. Be persistent in bringing your needs to him and wait with patience – surely, he will come swiftly to your aid.

Each Vocation Begins with a "Yes"

Not a grand declaration, but a quiet, courageous assent to the whisper of God's call. Here in the Diocese of Saskatoon, that "yes" is being lived out daily by four remarkable young men discerning the priesthood. Their journeys offer a powerful witness to God's faithfulness, the strength of formation, and the fruit of community prayer and generosity.

Answering the Call

We are deeply blessed to be accompanying these men—Huy Le, Mischa Taillon, John Paul Wasan, and Matthew Witzaney—as they walk the path of discernment and formation. Their "yes" is a living testimony to the impact of our diocesan ministries like the Project Timothy mentoring initiative, CCO on Campus and the Sts. Benedict and Scholastica (SBS) Formation Program.

Their stories are unique but share a common thread: a heart deeply moved by love for Christ and a desire to serve His Church.

- Huy Le, in his third year of theology at Christ the King Seminary, is one of our most senior seminarians. A
 former student of biology at the University of Saskatchewan and graduate of the St. Benedict's Lay Formation
 Program, Huy's leadership in youth ministry at Our Lady of La Vang Vietnamese Parish is a model of faithful
 service.
- Mischa Taillon and John Paul Wasan, both science graduates from the U of S, encountered Christ more deeply through student ministry. Mischa, especially, credits CCO and Project Timothy as pivotal in his discernment journey—proof of how our local programs are forming tomorrow's Church leaders.
- Matthew Witzaney, from Denzil, SK, has been dedicated to parish life since his childhood days as an altar server. His missionary experience in Black Lake and academic formation at St. Thomas Aquinas College in California reveal a readiness to lead with compassion and clarity.

These men are not only studying theology they are living missionary discipleship. Their formation includes rigorous academic study, spiritual direction, pastoral placements, and deep community life, all made possible through your prayers and support.

Forming Missionary Disciples

Behind each seminarian stands an entire community of support. One of our most powerful formation tools is the Sts. Benedict and Scholastica House, a three-year program designed to develop young men into missionary disciples. The final year focuses on pastoral formation, where participants like Jarrod Daunheimer and Connor Patterson experience deep spiritual growth through prayer, service, and community engagement.

The house has become a spiritual home for men seeking God's will, whether they pursue priesthood or simply desire a more authentic Catholic life. As Jarrod reflects, "The Rule, the practices of prayer, and the experiences of community all contribute to create an environment filled with the Holy Spirit, in which discernment becomes clearer."

Holy Spirit Parish Financial Stewardship

As shown above, parishioner contributions cover the day-to-day operations of the Parish with a small margin. It is important that parishioner contributions equal or exceed ordinary expenses so that the Parish can preserve and rebuild its savings for the future.

Major capital projects have reduced our cash savings by roughly \$636,000, after considering the donations made through the end of September. It is expected that there will be roughly another \$365,000 of expenses to complete the major mechanical project and roof repairs, resulting in a net reduction to cash of roughly \$1,000,000 during 2025 based on donations to date towards the *Caring for our Church Home* campaign.

Please continue to pray and discern your financial contributions to the parish which are needed to support all the church ministries, day to day operating expenses, and to replenish the savings of the parish so it remains financially health well into the future.

e ask something of God because we recognize that we are needy and unable to meet the need for which we plead. This itself is a good prayer because it acknowledges our human limitation, an acknowledgment that might be very difficult for us to voice. Such prayer is also an admission of our dependence on God and our trust in God's loving care. A prayer of petition can be profound. However, what are we to do when our request is not realized? Do we ask again? And, if so, how many times? If it is never realized, do we stop asking? This is precisely the issue in today's readings.

Sunday Readings

Exodus 17:8-13

Moses' hands, however, grew tired.... Aaron and Hur supported his hands...so that his hands remained steady until sunset.

2 Timothy 3:14-4:2

Proclaim the word; be persistent.

Luke 18:1-8

[Jesus] told them a parable about the necessity for them to pray always without becoming weary. Moses held his hands up in prayer, and he grew tired. His prayer addressed a community need—victory over the Amalekites—and two leaders of the community assisted him so that the plea for help could continue until victory was won.

The gospel passage tells a story about a woman whose need of justice made her bold. As a widow in a patriarchal society, she had no husband to speak on her behalf. She had to plead her own case again and again until a just decision was delivered. The moral of these stories is clear: Keep at it!

What happens when our prayer does not seem to be answered? It is still a good prayer, acknowledging our fundamental need and God's loving care of us. The moral of our story is the same: Trust and keep at it! #



ust before his ascension into heaven, Jesus instructed the apostles to remain in Jerusalem and "wait for 'the promise of the Father' about which you have heard me speak" (Acts 1:4). That promise was the Holy Spirit. After Jesus was "lifted up, and a cloud took him from their sight" (Acts 1:9), the apostles did as they were instructed and returned to Jerusalem. There, along with Mary, the Mother of Jesus, and about 120 other men and women, they went to an upper room and devoted themselves to prayer, waiting for the promised Spirit. They prayed for nine days; on the tenth day, the feast of

Pentecost, the promise of God was fulfilled as the Spirit descended upon them all. This was the first novena.

The word "novena" is from the Latin, meaning "ninefold." Typically, a novena is prayed for nine consecutive days, but it can also be nine consecutive weeks on the same day of the week. Making a novena helps us persevere in prayer. It's a kind of holy "streak," motivating us to keep a promise. "Don't break the streak" is a familiar refrain to those who are fans of Duolingo or Wordle or those who are trying to form a good habit like regularly exercising or journaling or visiting a loved one once a week.

To pray a novena, it's best to decide on a particular time of day and, if possible, a particular place to pray where you won't be interrupted. If you are journaling, keep your notebook or laptop or phone (silenced, please!) nearby. Get quiet. Settle down. Begin with the sign of the cross, a moment of silence, and the opening prayer. Then turn to that day's meditation. Afterward, give yourself a little time to think about what you have read, then end with an Our Father, a Hail Mary, and a Glory Be. Pray for perseverance and don't break the streak!

Others include novenas, litanies, and the tradition of lectio divina. Meditative prayer can provide comfort, solace, and sanctuary in our fragmented, too-often hectic and stressed-out lives. It doesn't require tons of time—it takes minutes, not hours—and everyone can benefit from it. Cradle Catholics may recall being told as a child to say the rosary, and they might have thought, No way! Fifty Hail Marys, six Our Fathers, the Creed! It's too long and boring! Isn't one Hail Mary enough? After many years on my faith journey, I now realize I was way off the mark. Praying the rosary is no dreary duty; it's a blessed privilege. Thank you, holy Mary, and my Catholic faith.



Be generous with your time

Jealously guarding our time can be considered a form of greed. We receive from God the gift of 24/7; we need to give some of it away. That's why this week we observe Pastoral Care Week, sponsored by the National Association of Catholic Chaplains. This week was established to recognize the many ways church professionals respond with attentive listening to those with physical, emotional, or spiritual concerns. Hospitals, prisons, nursing homes, and your local parish will accept volunteers who wish to donate their time for this important work. "What does love look like?" Saint Augustine asks. "It has the ears to hear the sighs and sorrows of others. That is what love looks like." Cut loose a couple of hours a week and give them to someone in need.

The virtue of patience

Waiting is among the greatest spiritual challenges a believer faces. Twentieth-century French philosopher and Jesuit priest Pierre Teilard de Chardin, whose visionary writings were not always well received in certain Catholic circles, knew what it meant to wait. It wasn't until several decades after his death that the church fully embraced his theological insights. His prayer "Patient Trust," borne out of his own trials, continues to offer hope for those who wait: "Above all, trust in the slow work of God. /We are quite naturally impatient in everything to reach the end without delay. . . . /Give Our Lord the benefit of believing that his hand is leading you, and accept the anxiety of feeling yourself in suspense and incomplete."

Hold yourself accountable

On the back of countless trucks on our highways appears the curious inquiry: "How is my driving?" The accompanying number to call invites our critique. What if we all came equipped with signs inviting the moral critique of those around us? We might be

surprised and not at all pleased with the feedback. Thankfully, Christianity doesn't rely on external judgment; Jesus even warned against judging others. But we are encouraged to perform our own regular examination of conscience. Take a look at your life and loves, relationships and resources, talents and time. How are you doing?

Thursday, Oct 23, 2025

Light a fire under your spiritual growth

Jesus shocks his disciples—and many of us as well, no doubt—when he declares that he came not to establish peace but rather division, to "set the earth on fire." What kind of fire did he have in mind? Fire in biblical times was associated with God's action in the world and the lives of people. Jesus is using strong language to impress upon us the importance of taking responsibility for our spiritual growth. Do our relationships, choices, lifestyles, and loyalties reflect the seriousness of the call to spiritual maturity? If not, what can we do today to begin to put things right?

Friday, Oct 24, 2025

Read the signs

We're used to thinking about God as "hidden" or invisible, requiring an effort to perceive in the world around us, and one whom we will know fully only when we die. After all, doesn't Saint Paul say, "Now we see in a mirror, dimly, but then we will see face to face"? But it's also true that signs of God, as Jesus said, lie everywhere and are as obvious as a cloud bringing rain or a hot wind promising warm weather. So be a meteorologist for God. The signs of Christ's presence are all around. Where do you see them?

Romans 7:18-25a; Luke 12:54-59 (477). "You know how to interpret the appearance of the earth and the sky; why do you not know how to interpret the present time?"

Saturday, Oct 25, 2025

Make God decisions

One of the choices life offers is whether to let God be part of your life. Of course, God is always present, within you and around you, but you can choose to ignore, shut out, or pretend God isn't there. Saint Paul called this 'I don't need God attitude' living in "the flesh" and believed this illusion of self-sufficiency hid the road to death. Openness to the divine, though—to the power and Spirit of Christ—guides you to life in God. "If we wish to make any progress in the service of God we must begin every day of our life with new eagerness," advises Saint Charles Borromeo. Find some ways to choose God today.
