Twenty-seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

Hab 1:2-3; 2:2-4 | 2 Tim 1:6-8, 13-14 | Lk 17:5-10

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

In today's Gospel, Jesus tells his disciples: "When you have done all you have been commanded, say, 'We are unprofitable servants; we have done what we were obliged to do." I think what Jesus is drawing us to see is the humility we need as his disciples. It's easy to get puffed up, thinking, "Well, I've done this" or "I've done that" in service of God. We can even start to feel that God owes us. But we are called to love God for God's own sake, not for the accolades or even the reward that comes from faithfully serving him. St. Ignatius of Loyola penned a beautiful prayer called the Prayer for Generosity that expresses the sentiment that I feel is at the heart of our Scriptures today: "Eternal Word, only begotten Son of God, teach me true generosity. Teach me to serve you as you deserve. To give without counting the cost ... to sacrifice myself without thought of any reward save the knowledge that I have done your will." Let's ask God to help us to serve him with generous hearts.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

In his second letter to Timothy, Paul calls us to "bear [our] share of the hardship for the gospel with the strength that comes from God." Serving the Lord requires that we rely on the gift of the Spirit within us who empowers us to serve courageously and generously. The good news, Paul tells us, is that "God did not give us a spirit of cowardice but rather of power and love and self-control." In our efforts to serve God and to share our faith with others, let's remember that it is God's grace that is at work within us, equipping us and strengthening us. Let's remember Jesus' promise that even if we only have faith the size of a tiny mustard seed, we can still do great things for God. Indeed, through the gift of faith and the gift of his Holy Spirit, God has truly given us immense spiritual power.

PRAY

Take a moment to examine your own heart. Is your discipleship fueled more by a hope of reward (heaven), or, by pure love of God? Take some time to pray with St. Ignatius of Loyola's Prayer for Generosity (the full text can be found online), asking the Lord to increase your generosity in serving him.



Update to Holy Spirit Parishioners Caring for Our Church Home Project September 30, 2025

The Original Project

Our major renovation project is nearing completion.

To recap, the original scope of work included:

- Replacement of the rectory roof due to its 40 + years of age,
- Replacement of the cedar shingles on the mansard roof with asphalt shingles,
- Replacement of the heating and cooling system in the sanctuary, chapel, sacristy
 and music rooms due to failed under slab ducting and failure of the large 12.5-ton
 unit serving the south half of the sanctuary,
- Replacement of two furnaces serving the rectory

The initial project was projected to cost \$970,601. Actual costs are projected at \$982,566.

Work completed to date:

- Rectory roof is completed.
 - o Including relining the internal eavestroughs and downspouts, which were as old as the original rectory roof.
- Asphalt shingles on the mansard roof have been completed.
- Heating and cooling units are installed and operational. There were three units installed on the roof and one unit installed on a stand behind the church.
- Rectory furnaces are installed.

Work still in process:

- Due to the failed under slab ducts, the re-design for heating and cooling airflow required installation of ducting on the walls.
 - The galvanized ducting is completed but the architectural covering of the ducts is in process.

- Painting and installation of LED lighting will be the last phases of this work.
 The LED lighting is required to minimize shadows under the ducting mounted on the interior walls.
- The new heating and cooling system will undergo an air balancing as soon as the ductwork finishes are done.
 - We are also working to have the return air louvres adjusted to minimize sound of the new heating and cooling system.
- Under slab ducts are being filled at the vent locations and covered with carpet to match, carpet which was taken from the sacristy. New flooring is being installed in the sacristy.
- New ceilings are to be installed in the confessional, sacristy and music rooms to cover the recently installed exposed ducting.
- A security fence will be installed around the large HVAC unit installed at the back of the church.

The Unexpected by the NE-Stained Glass Windows

During the process of installing the curb cuts for the HVAC units it was determined that there was significant saturation of the **NE roof section** by the stained-glass windows.

There has been leaking in that section of roofing for years, which was also very evident during the significant rains we experienced this summer. We were able to find sources of multiple leaks from the top of the bell tower down to and around the stained-glass windows, which had resulted in rotted wood structure and roof saturation.

The solution was to remove and replace this entire roof section, the exterior stucco wall in that alcove area, flashings on the beams of the metal roof sections and reseal of seams along the metal roof edges. The cost for this work was unavoidable and cost \$152,590. This work is completed.

Thanks to our parishioners for your understanding and financial support. It is our hope to have this project completed as soon as possible.

This year's spiritual impact:

- Project Timothy mentored 25 young adults through a year-long leadership and faith formation journey, culminating in retreats and deepened spirituality.
- Search Retreats empowered 80+ high school students in peer-led environments to discover Jesus in a personal and communal way.
- A Conquest & Challenge Clubs fostered weekly virtue-based formation for children ages 8-15, led by over 20 teen mentors. One club's food drive collected 3,000+ items for the Saskatoon Food Bank.
- Rilgrimage to Rome brought 29 young adults on a 10-day journey of hope and spiritual awakening culminating in an audience with Pope Leo.

This ministry touched over 325 young lives this year alone and the impact will echo for generations.



Bringing Home the Word

Have Faith

hat is so easy to say and so hard to do. This might be because we misunderstand what faith is and what it might do. Today's readings offer us three glimpses into what the Bible means by faith.

The reading from Habakkuk and the gospel passage seem to contradict each other. The gospel suggests that one can do wondrous things if one's faith is strong enough. Many people understand this literally and then are confused and terribly disappointed when things do not turn out as they wanted. Habakkuk is in a dire situation. He turned to God, but it seems to no avail: "You do not intervene"

God did not give us a spirit of cowardice but rather of power and love and self-control.

Luke 17:5-10

[Jesus said,] "When you have done all you have been commanded, say, 'We are unprofitable servants; we have done what we were obliged to do."" (Habakkuk 1:2). What response did he get? "Don't give up. Don't lose faith."

Paul's letter was written to Timothy, one of Paul's own converts to faith in the risen Lord. Paul encourages Timothy to remain steadfast in that faith. It's clear that faith is not solely a set of beliefs and doctrines; it is a way of life—one that follows and is inspired by the example Jesus' life provides. It is also clear that living such a life might be dangerous, as evidenced by Paul's own imprisonment.

Reading the gospel passage again after considering these reflections, one might understand the power of faith in a new way. Perhaps the mulberry tree stands for the struggles that had to be endured by Habakkuk, the danger that Timothy faced in a hostile world, and the hurdles that challenge our own faith. It assures us that if we don't lose faith, we also can do wondrous things. *



Meet Pope Leo XIV

here are people whose presence doesn't impose, but transforms. These people don't seek the spotlight, yet they "illuminate," as St. Thomas Aquinas once said. They don't raise their voices, yet they leave a lasting impression. They walk quietly behind the scenes, without a desire for prominence, yet they are often the soul behind key decisions—the whisper that orients, the listener who sustains.

Such has been the path of Robert Francis Prevost for decades: Augustinian friar, missionary in distant lands, bishop among the poor, prefect entrusted with discerning and appointing pastors throughout the

world, and now Successor of Peter under the name Leo XIV. Yet, above all, he has been a seeker: a tireless seeker of truth in the spirit of St. Augustine, his spiritual teacher. Like St. Augustine, bishop of Hippo, Prevost has understood the Christian life as an interior journey of constant searching—sustained by faith and nourished by prayer, study, and community.

His vocation was not born of strategy or calculation, but of that restlessness of heart to which Augustine gave immortal expression: "You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our heart is restless until it rests in you." For St. Augustine and for Prevost, truth is not an abstract concept or intellectual construction, but a living person: Jesus Christ.

He has been a seeker: a tireless seeker of truth in this world.

Leo XIV's life has not been an ecclesiastical climb to the top, but a pastoral path marked by service, empathy, and quiet fidelity. He never sought to stand out, yet he was chosen for one of the most demanding roles on earth. And he accepted it with the simplicity of someone who did not pursue the position, but who responds to a call. For him, as for many before him, service is not ambition, but—in the way of Jesus—a form of love. †

Wisdom from Catholic Update

From "Five Ways to Share Your Faith" by John Roberto

Nurturing the growth of faith at home occurs through religious activities connected with daily family routines: eating together; praying in the morning, in the evening, and at mealtimes; having family conversations; displaying sacred objects and religious images, especially a Bible, crucifix, or image of Jesus; celebrating holy days, holidays, and Church seasons; providing moral guidance; engaging in family devotions; reading the Bible; and serving the needy. When we invite God into our family activities, we grow in faith, recognize God's presence and love in our lives, and experience home life as holy. The household becomes a living "laboratory" for cultivating and nurturing the growing faith of young disciples. In generations past, religious activities were more naturally part of family life—passed on from generation to generation and supported by ethnic traditions. Today, a Catholic family must intentionally choose to plant and nurture faith practices.

Get ready for your close-up

Who is my neighbor? A man learned in Israelite law posed this question to Jesus. He asked neither what a neighbor was, nor how to treat a neighbor. The law had taught him that much. Rather he sought to know whom he needed to love. "Love thy neighbor" is a rule easy to understand and accept intellectually. Yet when we are face to face with other people, we are much more prone to excuse ourselves from this obligation. Thus, the Russian novelist Fyodor Dostoevsky wrote: "It's possible to love one's neighbor abstractly, and even occasionally from a distance, but hardly ever close up." Try to see your neighbors in those faces most difficult to love.

Choose the better part

We all know the gospel story of Martha and her sister Mary of Bethany. During a visit from their friend Jesus, Martha got a little steamed because she was stuck with the cooking and serving while Mary got to sit at the Master's feet and listen to his words. Like many an aggrieved sibling before and since, she took her gripe to a higher authority, in this case Christ himself: "Tell her to help me." But note: Jesus responded with neither condemnation nor praise. He merely said that Mary had "chosen the better part"—in other words, Mary realized the importance of taking time out of the busyness of everyday life for hearing the words and teachings of the Lord. You can, too.

More than words

Think about the Lord's Prayer: It sounds as if it's mostly about what God does, but it's just as much—maybe more—about what we are to do. "Hallowed by your name, your kingdom come" is not only praise of God but also a prayer for God's name to be known and God's kingdom to be fulfilled on Earth—both of which involve our cooperation. "Forgive us our sins as we forgive those indebted to us" reminds us of the uncomfortable truth that scripture

proclaims loud and clear: God will forgive us to the extent we forgive one another. Next time you pray the Our Father, don't only say the words: Resolve to fulfill them.

A perfect example

Most of us who have children and all of us who were once children carry some regrets about the whole parenting process. Even the most devoted parents fall short. The good news is that love covers a multitude of flaws. When children know they are truly loved, they can forgive much. As Saint John Chrysostom advises, "If from the beginning we teach children to love true wisdom, they will have greater wealth and glory than riches can provide." Parenting will never be perfect, but love, humility, and a desire to lead children toward wisdom can go a long way. And for all our shortcomings, we can always look to the greatest parent of all, God, for guidance and grace.

Cast your demons out

Demons can make for great supernatural thrillers in the entertainment world, but they can also wreak havoc on our lives. We bump into them all the time—an unkind word, a sense of entitlement, a disparaging attitude toward ourselves or others. Our demons may not be the apocalyptic creatures of *The Walking Dead* or the latest "survival horror" video game, but they are very real and very deadly nonetheless. They can rob us of our conscience, of our God-given capacity to move toward the good, foster right relationships, and seek God always. What demons are you tangling with and how might you, in the words of the Catechism of the Catholic Church (no. 385), be vigilant in shifting your focus to God and trusting in the "superabundance" of God's grace?

Yet Jesus demurs and turns the blessing back upon her and all like her. While Jesus' mother and her womb are indeed blessed as we pray in the "Hail Mary," Jesus takes even greater delight in those of either gender who allow his words to take root in their hearts, their inmost being—those who keep that word alive by nourishing it and sharing it with others. Jesus blesses us for laboring and bringing the Good News to birth today.
